2019 Active Shooter-Hostile Event Preparedness And Response Training For Places Of Worship

The Cincinnati Police Department is hosting a free four-hour course: *2019 Active Shooter-Hostile Event Preparedness and Response Training for Places of Worship*. This opportunity is open to any place of worship and will be instructed by the Cincinnati Police Department and Cincinnati Fire Department staff on **Tuesday, February 19, 2019, 5:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m.** Course attendees will be exposed to basic information and necessary skills to understand, prepare for, respond to, and report incidents of perceived, planned, or carried out acts involving violence. The course is offered free of cost, but limited to a maximum attendance of fifty (50) participants. **There are no pre-requisites required to attend this course.** The training session will be held at the Cincinnati Police Academy, 800 Evans Street, Cincinnati, Ohio 45204. Citizens interested in attending the training should register online at: www.cincinnati-oh.gov/police/ The registration deadline is **Tuesday, February 12, 2019.**

WE, TOO, SING AMERICA: THE CATHOLIC CHURCH AND THE MUSEUM OF AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY AND CULTURE

(9) As I approached the Museum, designed by Tanzanian native and British architect David Adjaye, I was struck immediately by its unique design and location. It is a visual wonder. The architect clearly did not want to repeat the white marble design typical of structures on The Mall. It is next to the Egyptian African style obelisk monument to our first president, George Washington, who “owned”** enslaved human beings* at his estate in Mt. Vernon, Va. The memorial to our third president, Thomas Jefferson, who “owned”** enslaved human beings* at his estate, Monticello, is nearby. A Greek temple on the horizon is the monument to our sixteenth president, Abraham Lincoln, who issued the historic Emancipation Proclamation, while arguing that perhaps the best thing for the “freed” former enslaved human beings whom he considered “inferior” would be their return to Africa. (It was from the steps of this monument that Dr. King proclaimed, “I have a dream!”) Also within sight are the Capitol and the White House, which were both built, in part, by enslaved people. These buildings, as well as the largely African American city of Washington, can be seen from within the Museum through strategically placed windows that look out onto the National Mall and beyond. These vistas fulfill the Museum’s commitment to use African American history and culture as a lens into what it means to be an American. **The Most Reverend Edward K. Braxton, Ph.D., S.T.D. 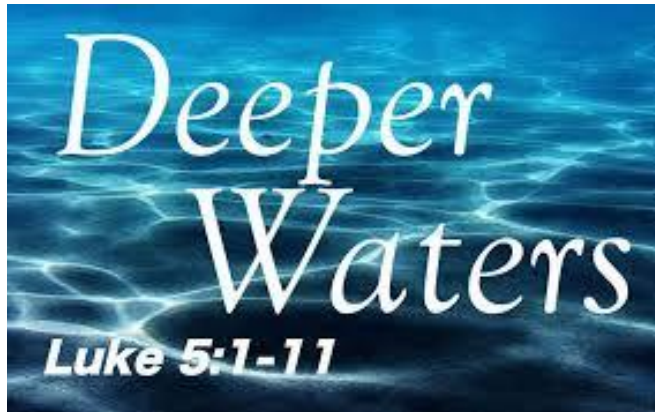

Fifth Sunday In Ordinary Time

February 10, 2019

Isaiah 6: 1 - 8

Psalms 138: 1 - 8

1 Corinthians 15: 1 - 11

Luke 5: 1 - 11

Simon and his fishing companions have been fishing all night, casting and pulling, casting and pulling. It was a slow fishing day – and nothing less enjoyable than a slow fishing day. But at the word of Jesus, they sailed out to deeper water which is not the best place for catching fishing. To their surprise, they hauled in a great catch, so great that their nets could hardly hold them. As fisherman, they would have already been on the shore, cleaning and mending nets for their next days' work. But, acting in the wisdom of God's only begotten Son, it produced a huge harvest.

The Word of God has incredible power. We have seen with Pope Francis that going deep into the Word of God is the critical base of all preaching and all witnessing. 'There is one particular way of listening to what the Lord wishes to tell us in his Word and of letting ourselves be transformed by the Spirit. It is what we call 'lectio divina.' It consists of reading God's Word in a moment of prayer and allowing it to enlighten and renew us.

The encounter with God's Word is to discern how that same message speaks to one's own life. The spiritual reading of a text must start with its literal sense. Otherwise we can easily make the text say what we think is convenient, useful or confirming us in our previous decisions, suited to our own patterns of thought. Ultimately this would be tantamount to using something sacred for our own benefit and then passing on this confusion to God's people. We must never forget that sometimes "even Satan disguises himself as an angel of light" (2 Corinthians 11:14).

When we make an effort to listen to the Lord, temptations usually arise. One of them is simply to feel troubled or burdened, and to turn away. Another common temptation is to think about what the text means for other people, and so avoid applying it to our own life. It can also happen that we look for excuses to water down the clear meaning of the text. Or we can wonder if God is demanding too much of us, asking for a decision which we are not yet prepared to make. This leads many people to stop taking pleasure in the encounter with God's Word; but this would mean forgetting that no one is more patient than God our Father, that no one is more understanding and willing to wait. God simply asks that we sincerely look at our life and present ourselves honestly before God, and that we be willing to continue to grow, asking from God what we ourselves cannot as yet achieve.

God has become human in Jesus. Jesus understands every human feeling, every human disappointment. Jesus is patient with us. As Peter and his companions exemplified for us, let us take the risk, take the challenge to push out to deeper waters to receive God's grace, love and mercy.
