Avondale

- The **Avondale Property:** Kingsley Investment Group, who is purchasing the former St. Andrew Church for \$350,000, has recently provided the money for demolition and has contracted with Sunesis, **Kingsley Investment Group recently gave our parish a check for \$15,000 to have someone oversee the demolition on our behalf.** This is the first income we have received from this purchase. A Closing date will be set once the demolition has been completed.
- **A Good News Development:** Sunesis is involved in **the construction project of the new wing** at the seminary, the Athenaeum of Ohio, on Beechmont Ave. Mt. Washington. **The stones from St. Andrew Church will be used in the construction of the new wing at the seminary!** There will be a plaque on a wall acknowledging where the stones came from.

Evanston

- The **Evanston Property:** Grasshopper Investments, LLC recently signed a contract with the intent to purchase for \$1.1 million. We recently agreed to an extension of 30 days for them to do their due diligence, which puts the inspection period concluding by February 6, 2019 and the potential closing soon after April 6, 2019.

Bond Hill

The side entrance church doors have been in a warehouse here in Cincinnati. The hold-up to installation has been getting the proper hardware. The “dummy handles,” then the real ones will be sent from overseas. An installation date is forthcoming. Hope it’s soon!

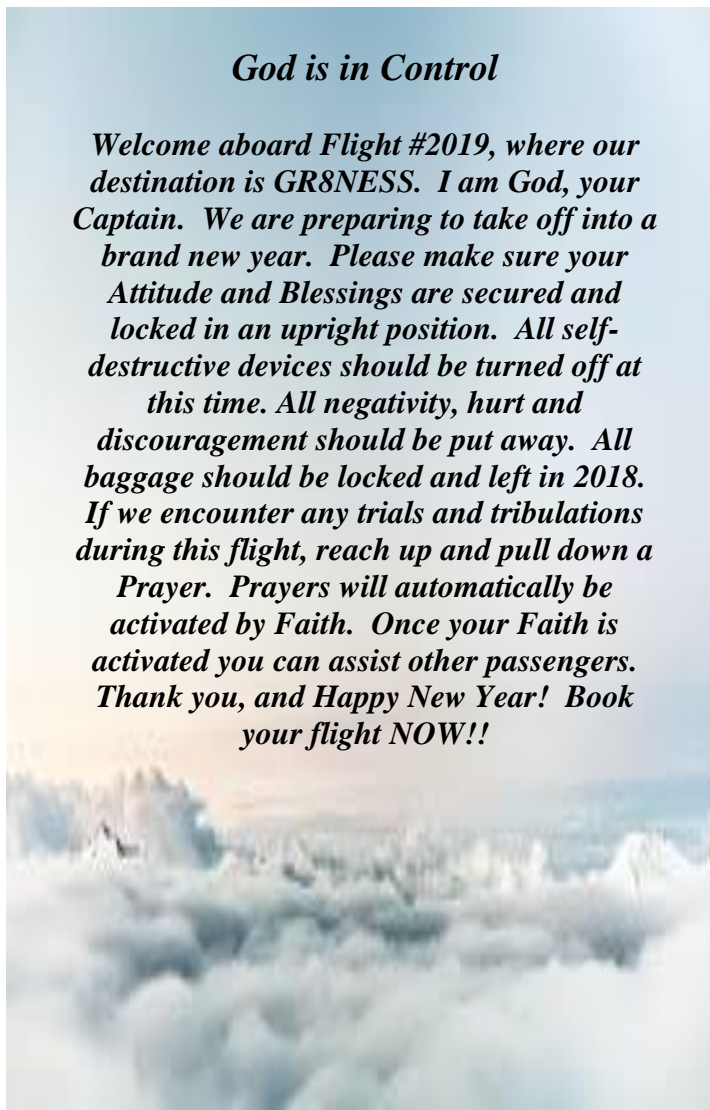

2019 Active Shooter-Hostile Event Preparedness And Response Training For Places Of Worship

The Cincinnati Police Department is hosting a free four-hour course: *2019 Active Shooter-Hostile Event Preparedness and Response Training for Places of Worship*. This opportunity is open to any place of worship and will be instructed by the Cincinnati Police Department and Cincinnati Fire Department staff on **Tuesday, February 19, 2019, 5:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m.** Course attendees will be exposed to basic information and necessary skills to understand, prepare for, respond to, and report incidents of perceived, planned, or carried out acts involving violence. The course is offered free of cost, but limited to a maximum attendance of fifty (50) participants. **There are no pre-requisites required to attend this course.** The training session will be held at the Cincinnati Police Academy, 800 Evans Street, Cincinnati, Ohio 45204. WE, TOO, SING AMERICA: THE CATHOLIC CHURCH AND THE MUSEUM OF AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY AND CULTURE

(9) As I approached the Museum, designed by Tanzanian native and British architect David Adjaye, I was struck immediately by its unique design and location. It is a visual wonder. The architect clearly did not want to repeat the white marble design typical of structures on The Mall. It is next to the Egyptian African style obelisk monument to our first president, George Washington, who “owned”** enslaved human beings* at his estate in Mt. Vernon, Va. The memorial to our third president, Thomas Jefferson, who “owned”** enslaved human beings* at his estate, Monticello, is nearby. A Greek temple on the horizon is the monument to our sixteenth president, Abraham Lincoln, who issued the historic Emancipation Proclamation, while arguing that perhaps the best thing for the “freed” former enslaved human beings whom he considered “inferior” would be their return to Africa. (It was from the steps of this monument that Dr. King proclaimed, “I have a dream!”) Also within sight are the Capitol and the White House, which were both built, in part, by enslaved people. These buildings, as well as the largely African American city of Washington, can be seen from within the Museum through strategically placed windows that look out onto the National Mall and beyond. These vistas fulfill the Museum’s commitment to use African American history and culture as a lens into what it means to be an American. **The Most Reverend Edward K. Braxton, Ph.D., S.T.D. In Defense of Liturgical Dance

Liturgical dance is one of the most controversial liturgical issues in the Roman Catholic Church in America, and is second only to whether or not to hold hands during the Our Father. Liturgical dance groups are deeply spiritual Catholics who volunteer their valuable time to choreograph, practice and provide an artistic expression of their faith.

Yet, some Catholics find liturgical dance abhorrent, at worst, and irrelevant, at best. One priest called it, "spiritual and liturgical terrorism." Cardinal Francis Arinze of Nigeria, former prefect of the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Sacraments stated, "Dance easily appeals to the senses and tends to call for approval, enjoyment, a desire for repetition."

Yet, the Church has learned to open its doors to cultural expression of the faith. For it states,

42. Among some peoples, singing is instinctively accompanied by hand-clapping, rhythmic swaying and dance movements on the part of the participants. Such forms of external expression can have a place in the liturgical actions of these peoples on condition that they are always the expression of true communal prayer of adoration, praise, offering and supplication, and not simply a performance.

43. The liturgical celebration is enriched by the presence of art, which helps the faithful to celebrate, meet God and pray. Art in the church, which is made up of all peoples and nations, should enjoy the freedom of expression as long as it enhances the beauty of the buildings and liturgical rites, investing them with the respect and honor which is their due.[90] The arts should also be truly significant in the life and tradition of the people.

20th Century Most Significant Social Justice Movement

"We must keep God in the forefront. Let us be Christian in all our actions." So spoke the newly elected president of the Montgomery Improvement Association, which had just been organized to lead a bus boycott to protest segregated seating in the city buses. The president, and new pastor of Dexter Avenue Baptist, went on to say that blacks must not hate their white opponents. "Love is one of the pinnacle parts of the Christian faith. There is another side called justice, and justice is really love in calculation." The movement produced scores of men and women who risked their lives to secure a more just and inclusive society, but the name Martin Luther King, Jr., stands out among them all.

Are You Keeping the Dream Alive?

To understand the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. one should first look to his Christian faith, which gave him the language, spiritual strength and community to fuel and sustain his singular efforts for justice, peace and freedom. Faith was at the center of his life. It is crucial to remember the sad truth that, while there were some Christians who supported King and his monumental efforts towards civil rights, against poverty, and for peace, there were many, many other Christians who either actively opposed his work or sat silently on the sidelines. We are in a similar moment today, where not all Christians who invoke the legacy of King, truly represent the vision he set forth for America. **Does your faith promote social justice and equality as well as individual charity as both integral parts of the Gospel?**
